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It's for fun.

Bea the dog is ready for Greenfield's Winter Carnival ... are you?

n Sunday, Bea, a four-year-old German shorthaired pointer, and her owner, Nate Bernard, will head to Beacon Field in Greenfield, where they will meet dozens of other dogs and owners waiting expectantly for the third annual K-9 Keg Pull during Greenfield's 93rd annual Winter Carnival.

At around 1 p.m., Bea will get strapped into a harness that's tethered to a "half-size," empty beer keg. Then, she will race the length of Beacon Field's outdoor ice skating rink and toward the finish line, where Bernard will be waiting for her. "Her focus is to run to me at the finish line. She has separation anxiety. That's what her advantage is," said Bernard, who lives in Turners

Bea is the reigning champion with the fastest overall time last year and will be racing to defend her two-time, first-place title in her size class. While some pups need motivation like treats, others, like Bea, are natural athletes. She doesn't train for the race since she is already fit from running alongside Bernard when he mountain bikes and hikes.

'We don't take it too seriously," said Bernard. "It's a great idea to donate and see Bea have fun."

The race, which raises money for the Paws Park of Greenfield, has five categories: full keg, half keg, quarter keg, bubba keg and an empty beer can for the small dogs. There are first-, second- and third-place awards in each cate-

Megan Edson of the Mighty Clean Mutt, a dog grooming salon, helps owners figure out what size keg is appropriate for their dog. "It's generally based on the size of the dog and what the owner thinks they can pull," said Rachael Kashner, race coordinator.

The race doesn't have strict sizing rules, Kashner added. If a bigger dog has a hip problem, he can pull a smaller keg. Or, if there's a smaller dog that is strong, the owner can try a bigger keg. In general, larger dogs, like a St. Bernard, will pull the full keg.

"It's for fun. If a dog doesn't do it, it's OK. It doesn't matter," said Rachael Kashner, the coordinator. "It's always funny and just as



- Sleds may not have plastic wrap, wood or other bottom surface material, or runners (unless cardboard). Tape is OK.
- Parents may help children build their sleds.

■ One entry per person. Prizes will be awarded for the following categories: Youth (under 16), fastest, most creative, zaniest and best crash; Group (two or more all ages), fastest, most creative, zaniest and best crash; Adults (16 and over, single riders), fastest and most creative; Corporate Challenge, best design; Overall Best "Frozen Theme"; Overall People's Choice.

3:45 p.m., The carnival will finish with the awards ceremony for winners of the ice carving, card board sled race, cookie bake-off, chili cookoff, sculpture contest, Lego contest, K9 keg pull and parade of light.
